Volunteer assignments are demand-driven and vary widely, from creating business plans, to developing financial products, to conducting agronomy trainings, and more.

Volunteer experts are matched with specific assignments to work directly alongside an organization for two weeks. Assignment timelines are based on organizational needs and volunteer availability.

Recruitment

Onboarding

- Meet virtually with the in-country field team and host organization to discuss the assignment and set dates.
- Complete onboarding paperwork.
- Review key volunteer resources.
- Book flights through IESC's team.
- Attend a virtual security briefing.
- Complete pre-departure prep work.

Assignment completion

- Arrive safely in country.
- Work with the team and host organization to complete your assignment.

Close-out

- Write and finalize your trip report.
- Submit your expenses.
- Complete post-assignment surveys.
- Share your experience on social media.
- Spread the word by referring new volunteers.
- Stay in touch for future opportunities.

Expenses

IESC provides round-trip economy airfare, lodging, and a daily stipend based on the location of travel. IESC will reimburse visa fees, CDC-recommended and required vaccines, transportation to the airport, and other assignment-related expenses.

In country

Typically, an in-country staff member accompanies volunteers on the first and final days of their assignment. When volunteers travel independently, our field team checks in daily.

Safety

All drivers, hotels, and assignment locations have been carefully vetted for safety. IESC's global security advisor is available 24/7 in case of a safety or security concern. If there is security risk, they provide real-time updates in a WhatsApp security group.
